


# Canada Continues to Lead G7 in Population Growth, but Growth Varies Across and Within Regions



### Census Population of 37 Million in 2021, Up 1.8 Million since 2016





### Population Growth Slowed by Pandemic


#### Estimated Annual Growth Rate, 2016-2021








### Immigration Accounted for about 80% of Total Growth



Population Growth Rate, Canada, Provinces and Territories, 2011-2016, 2016-2021





### Slowdown in Growth in Largest Areas but Increases in Smaller Areas





#### Mid-Sized CMAs Had Highest Growth


Population Growth Rate Among Census Metropolitan Areas (CMAs) in Canada, 2016-2021, Ranked by Percentage Growth





Estimated percent growth due to components, 2016-2021








#### A Note on the Concept of "Rural"

#### Statistics Canada defines rural as:

- An area with less than 1,000 inhabitants and a population density less than 400 people per square kilometre
- Rural areas can exist inside CMAs and CAs and urban areas outside CMAs and CAs
- According to that definition 17.8% of Canada's population lived in rural areas, an increase of 0.4% from 2021







#### An Alternative Definition of "Rural"


Few data sets can provide data on the urban/rural population as defined by density

- As a result, for many purposes rural gets defined as
  - The population outside the boundaries of CMAs/CAs. Essentially areas with less than 10,000 population
- According to this definition these "rural" areas occupy 16.1% of Canada's population and grew by 2.4% between 2016 and 2021.

### Provinces Differ on Extent and Growth of Areas Outside CMAs and CAs


Percent of Population Outside of CMA/CA, 2021


# Migration to Areas Outside CMA/CA Increased in Last Few Years, Particularly During the Pandemic

Net Intraprovincial Migration to Areas Outside CMA/CA 2001-2021









#### 2021 Census Percent Population Change 2016 - 2021 **British Columbia - By Census Division**


















#### 2021 Census Percent Population Change 2016 - 2021 Alberta - By Census Division









Population Change in Urban Areas, 2016-2021












Distribution of Population by Proximity to Downtown










# Saskatchewan: Immigration Remained High but also High Losses to other Provinces








### Ontario: Growth Almost Entirely due to Immigration, both Permanent and Temporary


Percent Population Growth, 2006-2021






## Highest Growth in Mid-Sized CMAs and Smaller Communities Outside Toronto





Distribution of Population by Proximity to Downtown















#### 2021 Census Percent Population Change 2016 - 2021 Québec - By Census Division








### Moderate Growth in Many Urban Areas, Including Many Smaller Places Outside Montreal










## PEI: Very High Immigration but also Gains from Other Provinces






## New Brunswick: Growth due to Immigration and Gains from other Provinces



#### 2021 Census Percent Population Change 2016 - 2021 Atlantic Canada - By Census Division








## Atlantic Canada: Higher Growth in Larger Urban Areas

Population Change in Urban Areas in Atlantic Canada, 2016-2021





## Atlantic Canada: Moderate Growth in Areas Outside CMAs and CAs in Maritimes







### Summary: What to Watch For



### Growth in Some Areas; Declines in Other Areas

- The federal government has set aggressive immigration targets for permanent residents- 431,645 in 2022; 447,055 in 2023 and 451,000 in 2024. National growth should increase to above 1.6 % per year.
- Growth areas to watch are
  - Maritime provinces
  - Continued good growth in B.C.
  - Medium sized CMAs
  - Smaller areas near large cities in cottage country/ destination/resort communities
  - Downtown and outlying areas of Large CMAs
- Declining populations in some small towns and rural areas and some northern areas



### **Implications**

- Growth will present new opportunities for marketers, but it will be important to recognize the characteristics of the growing population
- In many areas growth will be from new immigrants and marketers will need to develop an "ethnic" marketing strategy to reach these new Canadians; in other places growth may be mostly from older retirees
- Governments in growth areas may be challenged to provide the infrastructure and the services to a growing population
- In declining areas, businesses will need to adjust their product offerings, and governments may face challenges in maintaining emergency services, health care and social services like libraries and schools

### Coverage

- Statistics Canada conducts surveys to measure the extent of census coverage, both undercoverage and overcoverage. Results will not be known until 2023.
- In 2016 Census net undercoverage was 2.36% at the national level (undercoverage was 4.32% and overcoverage 1.96%)
- In 2016 net undercoverage ranged from 0.43% in Quebec to 4.07 in B.C.
- A change in the net undercoverage rate from the previous census will affect the census growth rate



### **Incompletely Enumerated Reserves**

- For 2021 there were 63 reserves where collection was not permitted or could not be completed. This was up from 13 reserves in the 2016 Census.
- For the reserves that were enumerated in 2016, in some tables the population is shown as 0 for 2021 but there is 2016 population if that reserve was enumerated in 2016. Care should be taken in measuring the change, particularly at the CD level, since in some cases the impact is substantial

### Changes to Census Collection

- A contactless Census
- In remote, northern and reserve communities, self-response will be permitted for the first time in 2021
- Follow-ups with households that do not respond will be done primarily by telephone

### Response to Census

Overall collection response rate of 98% -

Calculated as the number of private dwellings for which a completed questionnaire was returned, divided by the number of private dwellings classified as occupied by census enumerators.

• Self response rate was 88.1%

Completion of a census questionnaire without assistance from a Statistics Canada representative

• Internet response rate of 84.1%



# Possible Implications of the Pandemic for Population Counts

- Possible higher net under enumeration especially in North and hard to enumerate areas
- May have been some confusion as to where to report "usual residence" for those who moved temporarily to cottage or other location. On the other hand, the pandemic may have resulted in permanent moves to smaller places
- Data from Statistics Canada's Demographic Estimates Program have revealed that in 2020-21
  - Rural areas near large urban centres have experienced population growth greater than the previous five-year average.
  - Some trends that developed before the pandemic have accelerated, including higher population growth in more distant suburbs of urban areas as well as in many municipalities in the Maritimes.

#### 2022

- Still based on 2016 Census, but will incorporate some trends from 2021 Census

#### 2024

- Timing dependent on availability of estimates of undercoverage
- DemoStats will be based on 2021 Census-based estimates adjusted for 2021 coverage
