Canada was First Country to Count Transgender and Non-Binary People in a Census


What was this person's sex at birth?




Higher Diversity at Younger Ages




Population by Age





Census Population Change by age, 2016-2021, Canada




Working-Age Population Continued to Grow, but at Reduced Rate

Percentage Growth of Working Age Census Population, Age 15-64, Canada




Declines in Working Age Population in Some Areas


Growth of Population, Aged 15-64, 2016-2021






Now More Seniors than Children; Seniors will Reach 25% by 2036

Percent of Population under age 15 and over age 65




High Growth of Seniors Population will Continue but will Shift to Ages 75+



Atlantic Provinces have Oldest Populations


Percent of Population Aged 65+, 2021





All Provinces and Territories Had High Growth of Seniors' Population


Growth of Population Aged 65+, 2016-2021





2021 Census Percent of Population 65 and Over Canada - By Census Division





Percent of Population Aged 65 and Over, 2021






Percentage of Population Aged 65 and Over, CMAs, 2021






Rapid Growth of Population Aged 65+ in Some Areas

Change in Population Aged 65 and Over, CMAs, 2011-2016




Much Older Population in Some Smaller Urban Areas








Percent of Population by Generation




Boomers Still the Largest Generation but Not for Much Longer






Millennials Outnumber Boomers in Alberta and the North

Millennials and Boomers as percent of total population




Millennials Make-up over a Third of Downtown Population

Millennials as percent of total downtown population




Average Household Size Remains Constant

Households by Size, 2021, Canada






Over Half of All Dwellings are Single-Detached

Much Higher Growth for High-Rise Apartments


Growth in Number of Dwellings by Type, Canada




Nearly One Third of Women Over the Age of 85 Live in a Health Care or Related Institution

Percent of Population in Health Care and Related Facilities, Canada




Seniors Aged 85 and Over

Women as percent of population aged 85 and over




Oldest Seniors' Population to Grow More Rapidly in the Future






Number of Oldest Seniors Will Nearly Triple in 25 Years




Living in a Health Care or Related Facility Increases with Age

Summary: What to Watch For



Summary: New Data on Gender

- New data on gender provides organizations with information on population segments that might be of interest for marketing products or delivering services.
- Provides valuable baseline data to allow organizations to better measure the diversity of their workforce.

Aging of Population

- High growth of seniors' population means they will account for an increased share of household expenditures and this suggests more marketing efforts should be directed at seniors
- Provides businesses and industries offering products and services designed for seniors, especially the health care, travel and financial services industries.
- Businesses may want to consider modifying their stores and products to better serve an older population
- Increased demand for homecare services to allow seniors to remain in their homes
- Municipalities need to focus on making communities more age-friendly



Housing

- As population ages and downsizes there may be increased demand for apartments, particularly rental apartments
- May be increased demand for housing renovations to make homes more accessible for older population
- Pressures for alternatives to traditional nursing homes as status quo mean an increasing demand for nursing home care- close to doubling in next 15 years

- Shift to 2021 Census geography
- Still based on 2016 Census, but will incorporate some trends from 2021 Census

2024

- Timing dependent on availability of estimates of under coverage
- DemoStats will be based on 2021 Census-based estimates adjusted for 2021 coverage
